

Wandering in the desert Exodus 15:22 – 16:5.

You heard it here first - the learning in Year 3 is rubbish!

Outrage and indignation aren't words frequently used to describe the feelings of either staff or pupils at Saint James Primary School. However, they could justifiably be used to convey the depth of feeling that the children in Year 3 experienced when exploring the school site on Monday! Whilst walking past our environmental area, an area designated as a haven for wildlife, the children stopped abruptly in their tracks. Staring in disbelief, they beheld a mountain of plastic bags posing a threat to the creatures that make our grounds their home. Riled to the point of wanting to take affirmative action, they soon realised that their feelings closely emulated those of Isatou Ceesay, the Gambian protagonist in the inspiring true story they were focussing on in their latest English learning journey!

Not dissimilar to the UK, for years plastic bags have been a cheap and convenient option for carrying goods in Gambia. However, when these bags break, or are no longer needed, they are carelessly discarded, leading to an unsightly accumulation of plastic waste alongside roads. The stagnant water that accumulates in the bags provides a prime breeding ground for mosquitoes and diseases, while the burning of bags leaves behind a foul and toxic smell. If that isn't enough, the discarded bags also strangle plants, kill livestock, and pollute the environment. Quite some legacy!

Isatou's response was to take action, and she began to collect the plastic bags and recycle them into something new. Her efforts not only helped to clean up the environment, but also provided income for women in her community who had been struggling to make ends meet.

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Inspired by the Gambian women and their repurposing of plastic bags, Mrs Thompson decided to put her crocheting skills to good use. After cutting the bags into strips and joining them to make a large ball, she began to expertly crochet a new, stronger alternative. As you will see from the photograph, the resulting bag was truly impressive.

Although their response and consequent writing may prove to be less transformational than that of Isatou Ceesay, Year 3 are hoping to convey the urgency of need for an international response to plastic pollution. Their writing, and wish to be responsible and proactive Global Neighbours, will hopefully showcase their desire to inspire a positive change, themselves.

As an aside, our hard-working site team would like to make it clear that the mountain of plastic bags were 'planted' intentionally and temporarily by the Year 3 team and were not a result of poor grounds maintenance!

Hampshire Road Safety Team – Are you using the correct car seat?

The Hampshire Road Safety Team are responsible for educating young people and their families on the importance of keeping safe when travelling in a vehicle. Part of this education includes ensuring young people are travelling with correct restraints. It is a worrying statistic that 37% of children are currently in the wrong type of seat for their age and/or height.

To raise awareness, the Road Safety Team would like to share a car restraint leaflet with you to ensure you know how to always keep your child(ren) safe – in the correct restraint. 'There's no such thing as bad weather, only inappropriate clothes!' Depending on where you look, a number of sources claim to be the origin of this quote ranging from Alfred Wainwright to Billy Connolly, or it could be a traditional Swedish proverb. In school, although we would like to live by this adage, sometimes it is simply not possible. When the field is waterlogged, it becomes dangerous to hold a Sports Day and, when there is a strong chance that children will be sitting in wet clothing for the rest of the day, a walk across West End to St James' church becomes impractical. It was therefore with regret that we made the difficult decision to hold the Year 5 and 6 Harvest Service in the hall on Thursday, rather than at the church.

Although it is always special to attend a service at the church, Reverend Vicky and Reverend Linda made the resulting celebrations in school powerful, thought-provoking and thoroughly enjoyable!

We know that; unlike Nigella Lawson, Ms Lenney can pronounce the word 'microwave' correctly; unlike Gordon Ramsay, Mr Magrane uses vocabulary suitable for any audience; unlike Mary Berry, Mrs Thompson can't retire off the proceeds of her cookbooks and unlike Jamie Oliver, the only influence Mr Walsh has over school dinners is what he orders via the Aspens app. However, a comparison could be drawn between the aforementioned members of staff and famous TV chefs, through their performance in our special 'Harvest Festival Edition' of 'Ready, Steady, Cook'! We were able to revel in how our teachers and support staff were able to create something beautiful and wonderful from only a few ingredients and then observed how God's creation was even more amazing for all of us!

In addition to the entertaining interludes from Saint James staff, a number of powerful prayers and pertinent readings were shared by the children, allowing us to consider the importance of Harvest. We were able to celebrate God's generosity, as well as the kind contributions that our children and wider school community have made to benefit Eastleigh Basics Bank and those less fortunate. Thank you to everyone who donated food items for this extremely worthwhile cause.

No Saint James Harvest celebration would be complete without beautiful singing and this year was no exception. From the upbeat Saint James staple, 'Cauliflowers fluffy' to the rousing 'Harvest of the world', each service was accompanied by delightful singing. Thank you to Chris Fay, music director at St James church, and Mr Upfold for accompanying and leading the children in their vocal praise.

As always, we would like to thank Reverend Linda and Reverend Vicky for leading us in such joyous celebrations. However, a special thanks needs to be given this year for how accommodating they were in managing to adapt their respective services in light of last-minute changes. They were truly enjoyed by both pupils and staff!

Unfortunately, over the past few years our Saint James family, including staff, pupils and parents, has been devastatingly impacted by the cruel, indiscriminate disease that is Cancer. In remembrance of members of our community who have been affected by Cancer, two former members of staff, Gina Austin and Nickie Natt, held a Coffee and Cake morning in the staffroom on Monday breaktime in aid of Macmillan Cancer Care. Contributions were so staggering, that there was enough cake to sustain the staff over two days! No mean feat!

Once all the cake had finally been demolished, an impressive total of £482.25 was achieved. This will significantly increase once the Gift Aid contribution has been added.

Although not an event that directly involved the children, we wanted to celebrate it as so many members of our Saint James family have been impacted by this disease. We would like to say an enormous 'thank you' to our wonderful bakers and providers and to everyone who donated so generously to this worthwhile cause. It's rare we extend a 'thank you' to people for eating cake! Not the hardest chore in the world!

To put this achievement into context, £258 could pay for a Macmillan Nurse for a whole day, someone to provide medical,

practical and emotional support for people living with cancer and their loved ones. We would like to say a huge 'thank you' to Gina and Nickie for organising this event. It was lovely for staff and pupils to see you both again.


