Christmas brings many pleasures, both tangible and impalpable, but we would argue that few rival the pleasure of seeing children's happy faces singing joyfully in the church on a cold Christmas evening. The setting of St James church really does help make an already accomplished performance all the more special. Forget downloads and even CD singles, the Christmas Number one is sung at Saint James

The Beatles in 1963, 64 and 65, the Spice Girls in 1996, 1997 and 1998 and Ladbaby in 2018, 2019, 2020 and 2021 all share the enviable status of having Christmas number one in three or more consecutive years. However, topping the charts in 1984, 1989 and 2004, 'Do they know it's Christmas' by Band Aid is the only song to have reached the Christmas number one spot on three separate occasions.

Those records may be emulated or surpassed at Saint James Primary School over the next few years after the introduction of our own race for Christmas Number One. Whereas Paul McCartney, Bob Geldof, Midge Ure and the other writers of the aforementioned tracks may be well known to many of us (although admittedly, probably not our children!) the writers Joseph Mohr, William J. Kirkpatrick and Isaac Watts are arguably not. However, each of these lyricists has a song in the Saint James chart!

So, what is this chart that we're referring to? The Saint James Top Ten Christmas Carols, of course! After Reverend Linda collected the ballot sheets on which children voted for their favourite carol, the winning carol has been a closely guarded secret.

Wednesday morning's 'Songs of Praise' saw the countdown taking place, with the children singing the finalists from Number 6 in the chart down to the eventual Number One. To keep the suspense even longer, Reverend Linda even revealed the carols by means of a cryptic clue. Quiet at the end of the day? Silent Night, obviously!

So, which carol proudly achieved Number One status this year, eclipsing all other contenders? The overwhelming winner for 2024 was 'Away in a Manger', receiving significantly more votes than the second placed carol, 'Silent Night'. Christmas Card Competition

Christmas cards are still a lucrative business! The Royal Mail estimates that it delivers 150 million cards during the Christmas period and, on average, each person in the UK sends and receives 17 Christmas cards. However, other sources claim this is a hugely underestimated with up to one billion Christmas cards being sold in the UK annually. Whatever the truth, that's an awful lot of cards.

In the United Kingdom, Sir Henry Cole is credited with sending the first Christmas card. Designed by his artist friend John Horsley, it was a three panel design; two panels included images of people engaging in charity work and assisting the poor, while the third, a centre panel, had a large family sitting down to Christmas dinner. However, the 1,000 copies produced were not without controversy, the image of the family sitting down to celebrate Christmas dinner included children drinking glasses of wine alongside their parents! Unfortunately, although the gesture of sending a card was admired, the image drew criticism for promoting underage drinking!

Thankfully no controversy surrounds the Saint James entries into the Eastbrooke Homes Christmas Card competition, with ten of our children producing winning designs. Sophia's Super Swim

Representing Great Britain in two Olympic games and four World Championships, becoming the first British swimmer to win a World Championship title and receiving an MBE for services to swimming are all achievements that anyone would be rightly proud of. However, we would argue that swimming impressive distances to raise a significant amount of money for Southampton Children's Hospital, Diabetes Uk and a good friend with Wiedemann-Steiner Syndrome are equally, if not more, worthy and inspiring. Perhaps that is why the two individuals, who can proudly add these achievements to their CVs, came together this weekend for a meeting of mutual admiration and a one-to-one training session.

We've always admired the single-minded determination that Sophia, now in Year 5, has shown when approaching the fund-raising challenges she has initiated. Clearly we're not alone, as former World Champion Katy Sexton cleared her diary to hold a personal training session with Sophia prior to her 5k swim for Lily.

Lily, also in Year 5, is seeking to raise money to fund an assistance dog that will help her cope with the developmental delays, learning difficulties, sleep problems, digestion and feeding issues, unusual facial features, short stature, hypotonia, co-ordination problems, dental problems and hypertrichosis that are recognised symptoms of Wiedemann-Steiner Syndrome. Seeing how her friend copes with the challenges life throws at her and recognising the impact that an assistance dog will bring, inspired Sophia to take up her latest challenge.

Since her first challenge, Sophia's swimming has secured her a place in the squad for the City of Southampton Swimming Club and, on this occasion, the head coach, Matt, and her personal coach, Jodie, along with Sophia's dad, will be supporting her with the challenge. Swimming 5km, the biggest challenge Sophia has faced yet, is no mean feat and they have rigorously kept to a training programme over the past two months, to help guarantee her success.

In preparation for her final challenge, Sophia completed her first 4k on Saturday, taking an impressive 1 hour 57 mins. This bodes extremely well for Sophia's ultimate challenge, 5K, which she will complete on Saturday. We're sure after all her training and the top tips she's picked up from Katy, Sophia will easily complete her challenge.

Proposal for new housing

The main content of our newsletter will always be related to school-based activities, events and initiatives, along with the impressive feats and achievements of our wonderful children. However, there are sometimes local issues and events which we will try to signpost you towards. In the case of this article, many of us were unaware the proposal to build 4,600 new houses in West End. Whilst we are in no way seeking to influence your thoughts and opinions, we feel it is important that you are kept informed about proposals that will impact on your community. As the date for submitting comment on this proposed development is in January, you may want to take this opportunity to make your voice heard. The proposal, from Eastleigh Borough Council, is outlined below;

Do you want another 4,600 houses to be built in North West End? The Local Plan is currently being reviewed and the proposal is to build an additional 4,600 houses in West End, 4,600 in Fair Oak, 2,800 in Bishopstoke and 1,300 in Hedge End.

There is currently a consultation running to gather views about this. Attending the consultation does not count as submitting an objection or support for this development.

In order to have your views considered, you need to submit your comments:

- Via the online consultation page to complete the full survey or a short survey this is the preferred method
- By email to local.plan@eastleigh.gov.uk
- Or post them to Planning Policy, Upper Market Street, Eastleigh, SO50 9YN

All responses must be received by 5pm on 29 January 2025.

The issues and options consultation enables everyone to have their say before a decision is made. The consultation will run from 4 December to 29 January. There will be a series of 'drop-in sessions' around the Borough where people can talk to the team but please remember you still need to complete the survey, email or write in to formally share your views.
