A fabulous stimulus for creative and engaging writing, the only difficulty is trying to get a cohort of Year 6 children, who are used to life's creature comforts, to relate to these experiences. How do you enable children to empathise with feelings generated by incidents and events outside of their own frame of reference? You suddenly, without warning, take them from the comfort of their classrooms to enlist them in an impromptu boot camp that, at least in some way, recreates the conditions endured by Alex Rider in his MI6 training.

We imagine OFSTED might have had concerning comments to make, if the daily practise of Miss Howell and Mr Magrane involved blowing a whistle and barking loud and direct orders at children. However, that is what they were met with, as the doors to their classrooms were thrust open and children were directed to the MUGA.

Quickly falling into line, the new 'recruits' surveyed the sight in front of them; agility ladders, followed by hurdles, hoops, and straight-out sprinting formed the endurance challenge that lay ahead of them. Method actors throughout, Miss Howell and Mr Magrane were convincing as the nameless and brash training officers who tested Alex Rider to the limit.

Periodically, as our trainee spies tackled the course in front of them, a whistle was blown and orders barked to 'drop' and do press-ups and sit-ups or perform star jumps. A different perspective on parking problems

Thank you for those parents who have offered a different perspective on the ongoing issues with parking around our school. Although we have previously shared how the issues have impacted on the residents of Monarch Way and the surrounding area, it has been enlightening to hear from parents and how it impacts them. Whilst we anticipated that highlighting inconsiderate parking would be divisive, it clearly also impacts many of our families on a daily basis. We've shared one of many supportive comments we received, below;

'Thank you for calling out inconsiderate parking in the newsletter! It is so frustrating having to squeeze past cars parked over half the pavement, sometimes with their engines running!'

Issues experienced by families walking to and from school may not be apparent to some drivers, who perceive that issues are more related to inconvenience than safety. However, parents have reported that cars parking on pavements can block access for pedestrians. This is particularly detrimental for people with buggies or anyone in a wheelchair, forcing some to risk walking onto the road to enable them to pass. In addition, parking at the corners of junctions endangers children because it restricts visibility for both pedestrians and drivers, unfortunately this only serves to increase the risk of a collision.

Thank you to everyone who has made a concerted effort to park more considerately in the past week. Your actions have not only eased the lives of our neighbours but have also minimised the potential for an accident involving members of our school community. Thank you!
